Custody With Care

Visit to Central Prison Bengaluru

Dr. Soumya Mishra, IPS, Director General of Prisons & Correctional Services, undertook an official visit to the Central Prison Bengaluru, where institutional functioning, security mechanisms, inmate welfare measures, and rehabilitation initiatives were comprehensively reviewed. During the inspection, interaction was held with prison officials and staff, emphasizing discipline, transparency, and humane administration within correctional institutions. Infrastructure, healthcare facilities, kitchen hygiene, vocational training units, and digital monitoring systems were examined to ensure operations align with modern correctional standards. Special focus was placed on strengthening internal vigilance systems and improving coordination among supervisory staff. Directions were issued to enhance documentation practices and maintain strict compliance with prison manuals and legal safeguards.

Appreciation was conveyed for the efforts undertaken in skill development programs, counseling services, and capacity-building initiatives aimed at reducing recidivism. The visit reinforced the vision of transforming prisons into correctional institutions focused not only on custody but also on rehabilitation, dignity, and social responsibility. Emphasis was also laid on expanding vocational partnerships to improve post-release employment opportunities for inmates. The interaction concluded with a call for sustained professionalism, accountability, and commitment towards building a progressive and reform-oriented prison administration system.

The renewed MoU was formally signed by **Dr. Soumya Mishra, IPS, Director General of Prisons & Correctional Services, Telangana**, and **Sri Parampreet Singh, Regional Director, NIOS**, at a programme held at SICA, Hyderabad. Following the signing, **Dr. Soumya Mishra, IPS** chaired a comprehensive review meeting with NIOS officials, nodal officers, and teaching staff from multiple prisons to evaluate the progress of NIOS classes and streamline action plans for the upcoming examinations. **Key directives** included **maintaining detailed academic records, ensuring full attendance, completing the syllabus within scheduled timelines, filling vacant teaching posts, establishing new NIOS centres, and integrated computer-based learning facilities.**

The meeting further emphasized inter-departmental coordination, accountability, and empathetic engagement as essential elements for successful implementation. Plans were also explored to establish model apiculture units in select prisons, which would serve as training hubs and demonstration centres for inmates across the state. This forward-looking approach reflects the Telangana Prisons Department's commitment to creating rehabilitation ecosystems that combine skill development, economic empowerment, and positive behavioural transformation, ultimately contributing to safer and more self-sustaining communities.
